In previous newsletters I have written about my experience with Durwood as we have worked on literacy skills together. Durwood is training to be a volunteer firefighter and it was this that motivated him to improve his reading and writing abilities. In addition to his regular brigade training, Durwood completed a course last year to extend his computer and language skills. He was also awarded a certificate for "Most Improved New Firefighter" in term 4. This term we have both been attending other courses so we have suspended our sessions for the time being.

Working with Durwood and seeing his rapid progress made me realize that I needed more skills in order to continue extending his learning opportunities. When I enquired about volunteer training at the Healesville Living and Learning Centre they directed me to the Certificate IV in Assessment and Workplace Training. I hadn't thought about enrolling in a formal training course, but having discussed it with staff there (including the vocational guidance officer) it seemed like a sensible step to take. I am passionate about working with people who want to improve their reading and writing skills, and gaining the Certificate IV will help me towards that goal. I have continued to attend Creative Writing classes even though I don't aspire to be a published author. I enjoy the support and encouragement of the tutor (Jenni Overend) and the group as a whole and it's good to have a challenge that takes me outside my comfort zone. I took forward to resuming sessions with Durwood and perhaps meeting some new learners later in the year.


