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### A word from the Program Coordinator

The longest term in some time is finally coming to a close after twelve weeks of classes, meetings and program development. We have scheduled 37 programs for delivery in that time as well as taking extra enrolments into our ten continuing year-long programs. It has been a very busy time at the Centre and I am looking forward to the term break.

There have been some exciting programs on offer this term generating a great deal of activity around the grounds of HLLC.

One of the courses, Art Works, is a course that provides personal development and project based skills to participants. The project will be an art installation using leadlighting, mosaic and pottery to create a piece that depicts the Healesville region.

The group decided on this project to draw attention to the Centre and add some colour to the front entrance. The group plans to unveil their work early in term 3, 2008.

During the term, the Centre ran a Rights and Responsibilities of Committees workshop, funded through the Shire of Yarra Ranges Community Group Enrichment Program. The workshop was designed to give participants understanding of their rights and responsibilities, while developing their confidence to apply them. It was also a great avenue for participants to discuss any issues.

The participants provided a good selection of ideas for future good governance workshops. I hope that the Community Group Enrichment

Program continues as it provides an opportunity for community groups to undertake free training to empower their organisations. If your community group and/or sporting club would like some training around committees of management please give us a call.

I have been accepted into the ACE Literacy and Numeracy Capacity Building project. The project is designed to develop and expand the availability of resources in language, literacy and numeracy programs through a community of practice methodology.

The participants of this project will produce resources through research and collaboration that can be shared by Adult Community Education providers throughout the state. The project will enhance classroom delivery by providing quality resources. It will also influence literacy and numeracy provision in the adult education and training sector.

It is about being involved in projects that create a change in ACE. I wanted to be pro-active, instead of grumbling about the lack of resources for literacy and numeracy, get involved in changing it.

It is projects like this one that provides innovative developments in our classes. It is an opportunity to raise the bar in terms of our quality of service to the community.

### Student Artwork on Display


#### Predominantly PASTELS Catalogue
